FOLLOWING KEY PRINCIPLES

We are aware of local and national structures for coordination and taking part when possible	
We have carried out a risk assessment for this project and are following safety guidelines	
All staff and volunteers have been briefed and have signed our child safeguarding policy	
We have identified the most vulnerable children and have looked for ways to include children who might be excluded	
We have found ways to listen to children's views as part of this programme	
Our project helps to build children's resilience and builds on children's own strengths	
Child protection reporting systems are in place and the project supports existing child protection systems

We have carried out a needs assessment to understand the current situation for children	
Our programme fills an identified gap where others are not providing	
We have resources available for this project (time, people, skills, connections, finances)
